Background to the Training

Poultry and livestock farming hold immense potential in transforming the livelihoods of young people across both rural and peri-urban communities in Ghana. The demand for poultry products such as meat and eggs continue to rise due to urbanization, population growth, and changing dietary preferences. As of 2023, the Ghana Poultry Project estimates that the country imports over 200,000 metric tons of poultry products annually, underscoring the need for local production to bridge the gap.

Smallholder poultry production in Ghana is predominantly traditional, relying on indigenous breeds with limited inputs in housing, feeding, and veterinary services. These low-input, low-output systems often lead to suboptimal productivity and limited income generation. According to the Ministry of Food and Agriculture (MoFA), over 60% of rural households rear poultry, yet national self-sufficiency in poultry meat is below 20%.

Improving the productivity and sustainability of these systems requires integrated interventions. This includes promoting climate-resilient and genetically improved poultry and livestock breeds, enhancing farmer access to best-cost feeds and veterinary services, and delivering inclusive training programs that develop both technical and business capacity.

To respond to these challenges and harness the vast youth potential in agribusiness, the Animal Research Institute in partnership with Feedico Poultry and Animal Feed Centre is embarking on a strategic training initiative. The program aims to provide young Ghanaians with the knowledge, tools, and networks to thrive in poultry and livestock farming while contributing to national food security, employment, and economic development.



Problem Statement

Ghana's livestock and poultry sector is critical to national food security and rural livelihoods but faces several challenges. These include low productivity, limited access to quality feed, inadequate training in modern practices, and a high dependence on poultry imports. These constraints hinder the sector's growth despite increasing domestic demand for animal protein. Youth unemployment remains high, particularly in rural areas where opportunities in agriculture are underutilized due to skill gaps. This program seeks to address these issues through practical, region-specific training to empower youth and farmers, enhance local production, and contribute to sustainable economic development.

Vision for the Future

This initiative envisions the development of a youth-driven, commercially viable and resilient poultry and livestock farming sector in Ghana. It aims to:

- Empower 10,000 young farmers across all 16 regions of Ghana by 2030 through targeted training and enterprise incubation.
- Enhance national poultry meat self-sufficiency from 20% to at least 50% within the next 5 years.
- Promote youth employment through agribusiness value chain integration, especially in hatcheries, feed production, veterinary services, and marketing.



Objectives of the Training

The training is designed with the following key objectives:

- Build technical and practical competencies of young farmers in poultry and livestock management, including housing design, feeding, biosecurity, and flock health.
- 2 Strengthen hatchery outcomes by equipping participants with a clear understanding of fertile egg incubation and chick management techniques.
- Introduce innovative technologies such as the hay-box brooder system to improve chick survival rates during early development stages.
- Promote livestock-based nutrition by increasing awareness of the nutritional benefits of eggs, chicken meat, and animal protein in daily diets.
- 5 Enhance business and record-keeping skills to support long-term enterprise sustainability and access to finance.
- Foster value chain linkages, connecting young farmers to input suppliers, processors, and markets to increase profitability.

Components of the Training Program

Classroom and Practical Demonstrations:

- Delivered at Animal research training institute facilities and selected regional demonstration farms.
- Mentorship and Coaching: Led by experienced agripreneurs and extension officers from the Animal Research Institute.
- Farm Inputs and Starter Kits: Provision of improved chicks, starter feed, and vaccination support to kickstart participants' farms.
- Market Access Platforms: Linking youth agripreneurs with institutional buyers and digital marketplaces.
- Monitoring and Evaluation: Tracking performance and impact, with data analytics to inform scaling strategies.



The Focus of the Program

- 1. Equip young farmers with practical skills in sustainable livestock and poultry production.
- 2. Promote innovative, regionally tailored animal husbandry methods.
- 3. Improve national food security through increased local meat and egg production.
- 4. Support government policy in reducing poultry imports.
- 5. Strengthen institutional collaboration between research bodies and farming communities.

Training Scope and Content

- The training will be delivered in all 16 regions and will include both theoretical instruction and hands-on experience in:
- Poultry: Broilers, Layers, Indigenous breeds
- Pig Farming
- Small Ruminants: Goats and Sheep
- Cattle: Beef and Dairy
- Feed Formulation and Nutrition
- Animal Health and Biosecurity
- Agribusiness, Financial Literacy, Book keeping and Farm Management

Training will be implemented using workshops, field demonstrations, digital learning tools, and mentorship models.

Implementation Phases and Timeline

Phase 1: Program Launch (10th June 2025)

- Official program announcement
- Stakeholder briefings
- Public awareness and media campaigns

Outcome: National visibility and stakeholder buy-in

Phase 2: Training Rollout (July 28, 2025 – December 2026)

- Two training sessions per month in different regions
- Target: Youth, women, farmer groups, and agripreneurs

Outcome: Over 10,000 individuals trained nationwide

Phase 3: Monitoring, Evaluation, and Learning (Continuous)

- Quarterly progress evaluations
- Annual documentation of outcomes and lessons learned
- Adaptive updates to training curriculum based on feedback

As a flagship program under the current government's agribusiness transformation agenda, the Office shall play a central guiding role, ensuring that all components of the initiative are aligned with the vision, policies, and priorities of the Government of Ghana.

Animal Research Institute (ARI)

- Develop and deliver research-based training content
- Lead monitoring and evaluation efforts
- Provide expert trainers and facilitators

Feedico Poultry and Animal Feed Centre

- Conduct feed production and nutritional training
- Supply starter kits and technical resources
- Establish demonstration farms where needed

Strategic Partners (Government, NGOs, Private Sector)

- Offer financial, logistical, and policy support
- Connect trainees with markets and inputs
- Promote scaling and sustainability of successful models

Theory of Change: Poultry and Livestock Youth Agripreneurship in Ghana

Context and Problem

- Ghana faces low self-sufficiency in poultry meat (<20%).
- Youth unemployment is high, especially in rural areas.
- Poultry and livestock systems are predominantly traditional, low-input, and low-output.
- High dependence on imports despite increasing domestic demand for animal protein.

Goal / Impact

Transform Ghana's poultry and livestock sector into a youth-driven, resilient, and commercially viable industry that contributes to national food security, employment, and rural development.

Intermediate Outcomes

- 10,000+ youth trained and actively running livestock/poultry businesses.
- Adoption of climate-resilient, efficient livestock practices.
- Increased productivity and profitability among youth-led farms.
- Strengthened market linkages and agribusiness ecosystems.
- Improved access to veterinary services, feed, and inputs.

Outputs

- Practical training sessions delivered in all 16 regions.
- Starter kits and improved breeds distributed.
- Demonstration farms and mentorship programs established.
- Business plans developed and financial linkages created.
- Market platforms for youth agripreneurs operational.
- Regional training data, policy briefs, and recommendations produced.

Activities

- Organize two regional training sessions monthly.
- Deliver modules on poultry, pigs, ruminants, feed formulation, and agribusiness.
- Distribute farm inputs (chicks, feed, vaccines).
- Provide ongoing coaching and mentorship.
- Facilitate access to digital and physical markets.
- Conduct monitoring, evaluation, and adaptive learning.

Inputs

- Expertise from Animal Research Institute (ARI) and Feedico.
- Funding and technical support from government and partners.
- Infrastructure for training, demo farms, and logistics.
- Training manuals, feed tools, veterinary kits.
